Features of the commentary:

- <u>Clickable Curated Vocabulary</u> Based on the most common words in Latin Literature (Diederich's List).
- Extensive background materials Interactive timeline, accessible biographical and historical background.
- <u>Teaching Materials</u> Grammatical & Vocabulary activities accompany the text.
